1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Reena Mehta College of Arts Science Commerce and Management Studies is a Linguistic Minority Educational Institution. The college is a pioneer institution offering education to poor students also.

The college has a visionary management with a mission to make education accessible to all Students. The college was started in the year 2003 by our founder Mrs. Reena Mehta with an aim to provide education to poor girls. Due to the wholehearted support of the management, the college has started many new ventures so that students can attain benefit.

The College started with a strength of 90 students in 1 programme, which has grown today to 2000 students and 13 programmes. The College has 10 undergraduates and 3 post graduate programmes. The College has efficient experienced and enthusiastic teachers. The College was accredited with 'B' Grade in 2017. The College has developed as well as constructed 2 floors Post NAAC accreditation.

The College has carved a niche for itself among all stakeholders by providing a safe academic environment. The students are empowered through value based education, discipline and varied extension activities. The College supports acquisition of knowledge by students through emphasis on interactive and participative learning.

A distinctive feature of the College is the strong bond between teachers and students as evident from the interactions and feedback. The alumni credit the Institution for imbibing values of hard work, time management, team spirit, professionalism and ethics.

The college has been actively taking part in the competitions organized by different Colleges and Universities.

The college is affiliated to University of Mumbai.

The Institution's Value Orientated Inclusive Culture has resulted in broader vision transcending all narrow concerns. The college aims to provide students with quality educational experiences and support services that lead to a thinking and empowered individual.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- Visionary, Proactive and Progressive management
- The college has a policy of giving admission on first come first serve basis and not essentially on merit.
- Conveniently located and easily accessible, the college has excellent infrastructure with sufficient number of Smart Class Rooms, Laboratories, Seminar Halls, LCD Projectors, Computers and Laptops, Computer laboratories, Library, Students' Common Room help in experiential learning.
- An active IQAC has been instrumental in introducing quality initiatives and supporting the growth and expansion of the Institution.

- Feedback on Curriculum has been collected systematically from various stakeholders such as student's teachers, alumni and employers.
- The faculty members adopt ICT for teaching, learning and evaluation process.
- The College organizes faculty development programme for academic enrichment of faculties.
- The College lays strong emphasis on all round personality development of students through extra and co-curricular activities.
- The faculty members adopt ICT for teaching, learning and evaluation process.
- The Students' Council DLLE and NSS are vibrant units working for giving wide-ranging opportunities to students.
- The college focuses on Skill training where students can get training in different courses like Tally, Retail management, GST, Android Applications, Digital Marketing etc.
- Innovative teaching and learning process and institutional LMS and YouTube Channel are effectively followed to ensures holistic education development of students
- Environmental friendly practices like rain water harvesting, LED lights, Wet, Dry and e-waste management are practiced.

Institutional Weakness

- The College being affiliated to the University of Mumbai has to adhere to the curriculum and examination system designed by University. Thus the institution does not have the freedom to make changes in curriculum as per the contemporary requirements.
- Low Contribution by the Alumni.
- Progression to further higher education suffers because many students come from economically weaker sections of society and have to support their families during and immediately after graduation.
- Lack of National and International students and faculty.
- There is only a limited revenue generation done through research and consultancy work.
- Non receipt of financial assistance from government agencies.
- Reluctance among students to take up campus placement opportunities as they are already in some jobs.
- Unhealthy admission competition from neighbouring colleges.
- Difficulties in tapping external funding from UGC/Government for developmental activities.
- Minimal exposure to civil services and overseas Career Advancement Examinations

Institutional Opportunity

- Research can be strengthened by applying for research center and research guides.
- The college can develop Industry-Academia liaisons to strengthen on campus placements and Industry oriented courses can be designed to ensure employability.
- There is scope for using the in-house capabilities for enhancing technology up gradation.
- The College has to create long term framework for Waste Management System.
- Enhance the scope of National/international MOUs and linkages for collaborative research & academic exchanges for the students and faculty.
- To introduce earn and learn scheme.
- The Covid-19 pandemic has given an opportunity to re-invent modes and methods of teaching. Students and teachers alike have innovated and adopted to new modes of engagement by training in several **Online platforms** like Microsoft Teams, Zoom, and Google Meet. Teaching- Learning process has been enhanced and supplemented by quality e-resources.

- The main focus of the college is “Learn while You Earn”.

Institutional Challenge

- The College faces challenge in motivating students to be career oriented and to participate in activities in large numbers.
- As new programmes are not financially supported by the government, the fee is comparatively more than that of fees charged in Grant-in-Aid Programmes. As the college caters to the underprivileged section of society, student enrollment is a challenge in self-financed courses.
- Motivating students to undertake internships, field visits, etc., in programmes where it is not compulsory, is difficult.
- Continuous up gradation of computer infrastructure due to change in syllabus and new LMS systems involves high cost, both financially and technically.
- The college has to explore possibilities of introducing updated and current trends under the existing curricular constraints of the affiliating University.
- Difficulty in placement opportunities for graduates of Information Technology.
- Difficulty in getting govt. grants for research and development for the self-financing college.
- Framing the syllabus as per industry requirements to impart employability Skills.
- Procuring financial resources for up-gradation of infrastructure and developmental projects is often a challenge, which results in either stalling or shelving development works in the college.
- High cost of maintaining and Updating of Software and infrastructure.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The College is affiliated to University of Mumbai. It offers 13 programmes in all, Arts, Commerce and Management studies: 10 UG programmes, and 3 PG programmes. The syllabus for majority of the courses has been revised during last five years. In the assessment period certificate and value added courses have been conducted benefitting the students immensely.

Faculty members are paper setters, examiners and moderators at the University level. The College organizes syllabus revision workshops in association with Board of Studies, University of Mumbai. Teachers regularly attend faculty development programmes on revised syllabus. Feedback on syllabus is taken from all stakeholders including students, alumni, and employers, and the same is shared with the members of Board of Studies for necessary action.

For fostering global competencies among students, Classroom teaching is supplemented with seminars, quiz, and short films. Choice, Grading and Semester system has been introduced in all programs. Internships, field trips, and project work enhance the competitiveness of students.

The planning of the Academic and co-curricular activities of the college is executed by the IQAC before the initiation of the new academic year. Visualization of the curriculum is carried out by planning which is reflected in the Academic Calendar, and Departmental Calendar where important activities are planned regarding who, what, how, when and is indicated clearly. Teachers take utmost care to complete the syllabus in time. Post accreditation, additional division has been introduced in five programmes of B.COM, BAF, BBI,

BMS and BMM (BAMMC). Academic excellence is given prime importance both by College Development Committee and IQAC.

POs, PSOs and COs are University driven and followed by the college. These are shared with the students in the beginning of each semester. Efforts are made to enhance the mode of outcomes to fulfill the Vision and Mission of the institution, and the needs of society. In the post accreditation period the college has implemented 4 new UG programmes, 3 New PG Programmes and introduced value added courses as well as Diploma courses. The institution has also integrated issues relevant to Gender, Environment and Sustainability, Human Values and Professional Ethics into the Curriculum.

Feedback on curriculum taken from students, parents, employers and alumni is analyzed and suggestions are forwarded to Coordinators. Analysis of the same is also displayed on the college website.

- Healthy mechanism for **well-planned curriculum delivery** and documentation for quality education.
- Follows **Choice Based Credit System** for various programmes.
- The college has a team of young and experienced teaching faculty to cater the curricular and co-curricular needs of the students.
- Enough care is taken for the systematic implementation of the prescribed syllabus.
- The feedback system involving the stakeholders ensures action towards addressing any gap in student progression and overall development.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Teaching learning activities include relevant context based education with a variety of value added, bridge, remedial, mentoring, enrichment courses, guest lectures, talks by alumni, exhibitions which assist students to develop academically.

The institution has a transparent admission process to cater for the needs of students from diverse backgrounds and geographic. The teaching-learning and evaluation are done in a transparent way.

Innovative teaching learning experiences enrich learning systems further. Steps taken to improve both advanced and academically weak learners include specialized coaching by Department of Accountancy, Economics, and Mathematics resulting in improved scores. The experiential and participative teaching methodologies promote seminars, workshops, student exchange programmes in alignment with present day demands. Academic calendar earmarks dedicated slots for important days and weeklong educative programmes.

More than 90% of teachers use ICT tools for effective teaching with a learning management system. An effective mentoring system is followed by maintaining a 50:1 Student to mentor ratio. Management is keen on recruiting the faculty with the required qualifications as per the requirement based on the workload.

Community outreach activities include adopting NGO, interacting with malnourished children, shelter homes, orphanages. An interaction between students and senior citizens helped to arouse empathy and promote communication. Entrepreneurial skill development programmes hone student's creativity and business abilities. A gradual increase in using ICT classrooms has enabled a break from traditional pedagogical methods. Feedback from all stakeholders enforces an improvement in the quality mechanism of the college. Continuous Internal Evaluation encourages students of varying capabilities to perform well. The robust exam grievance mechanism enables a transparent approach and redressal for students within a time bound frame. Under the

recommendation of the unfair means committee, students with issues are sent for counseling to encourage leadership skills, students are placed in responsible positions in different committees.

- Student-Centric learning methods.
- The IQAC initiated steps for slow learners and advanced learners.
- The competitions like paper presentation, essay writing, elocution competition, etc. were conducted.
- The college organizes a field visit, excursion tours, industrial visits etc.
- Faculty development programs are organized to induct teachers in continuous learning and has recorded enhanced participation and presentation of papers in various seminars and conferences.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Research promotion policy provides facilities, incentives, and training to researchers. Promoting faculty to apply for research projects, presenting papers in workshops publishing in Journals and books. To improve research skill of the students and faculty the cell has organized research competition, seminars and value added courses. The institution has received an appreciation letter from the local government for extension activities organized in the nearby villages.

The faculty members and students have participated and presented research papers in various conferences, seminars and workshops. Every year the college publishes a College Magazine to encourage students for writing skills. There are 4 PhD holders, 1 research co-guide and 2 faculty pursuing PhD are working in our college. A minor research project sponsored by UGC was carried out during the period.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Infrastructure is the backbone of an institution and its regular up-gradation and maintenance contribute to the effective delivery of curricular, extra-curricular and administrative activities.

1. **Physical Infrastructure:** The College has sq. ft. built-in area, with four floors, with adequate parking facility, is available for two wheelers. The building has lift, one ramp, and restroom. Classrooms equipped with LCD Projectors, Computer Labs, Laboratories, Seminar Hall, Conference Halls, Auditorium, Library, Cafeteria, Common rooms for boys and girls, basic & adequate amenities like water, electricity back up, CCTV, gym, yoga center etc. are provided.
2. **Library as Learning Resource:** The fully automated Library comprises of Digital Library, Reading Hall, Departmental Library, and Periodicals Section for accessing e-resources, Circulation Counter. Library services are fully computerized to handle routine work of Issue and Return of books online with the help of software. The library has remote access to all e-publications through N-list (INFLIBNET). Library is equipped with 10 computers. The average annual budget for library is Rs. 5 Lakhs. Library services are automated by the ILMS software SOUL 3.0; OPAC through SOUL service is also provided to the student's users in the reading room.
3. **Maintenance of Campus Infrastructure:** Regular maintenance and upkeep of IT facilities and equipment is entrusted through Annual Maintenance Contracts Systems & Solutions. Maintenance of physical infrastructure, building, class rooms, lab etc. All the departments follow well-established procedures to ensure proper functioning and maintenance of all laboratory equipment's and stocks register is maintained.
4. **IT infrastructure:** The College has an adequate ICT facility with sufficient number of computers (120)

with latest configuration and power back up. All offices and library are connected through LAN and an internet connection of Wi-Fi (200 Mbps) which can be accessed through firewall.

To support sports, NSS as well as cultural activities the college has an auditorium with a capacity of 500 students. Fire extinguishers and CCTVs are located at strategic locations over the entire campus.

The management of the college arranges up gradation and maintenance of infrastructure on request of College Development Council

Student Support and Progression

Student Support activities of the College is steered by Management Principal Head of Department and Faculties. To promote students' participation in cultural and sports activities, Students Council and Sports department arrange a series of activities like Fresher Party, Independence Day, Teachers Day, Navratri Festival, Republic day, Farewell, Sports day, Foundation day etc. In the cultural events organized by the council every year more than 1000 students participate. Mridang, an intercollegiate sports event organized from 2012 had more than 2280 students from 140 colleges who participated in the various events in the last two seasons. Alumni are involved in the development of the college and offer expertise, financial assistance etc.

Along with the scholarship and free ship provided by the government, the institute has also given discounts on fees for the benefit of the students. To improve Grievance redressal system a time line is fixed for the closure of Grievance. Placement drives initiated by the Placement cell has enabled appointment in reputed organizations and it has developed more linkages with the employers.

On the basis of the recommendations made by various departments more steps were initiated to improve career preparedness of the students which includes the following: -

- Skills Academy providing more skill certificate course.
- Guidance for competitive exams organized by various departments
- Introduction of more remedial and bridge courses
- Counselling and guidance related to career.

Students' participation in organizing events is encouraged in academic and administrative levels like department clubs, IQAC, cultural, sports. Yoga and personal counseling sessions help students in excelling in academic performance and personality development. Equal Placement opportunity is provided to all the eligible students of the college by the placement cell. An average of 35% of students is placed during the last 5 years through campus recruitment. The excellence and expertise in their specialization help students to have a better progression in higher education such as post-graduation, enhanced enrolments in the study specific areas of interest.

Governance, Leadership and Management

With a well-defined Vision and Mission statement, the Institution practices decentralization and participative management in academic and administration. The Vision and Mission of the institution translate in to action through an effective governance system. The Principal of the college has complete authority for the smooth functioning of the institution. However, The Governing Body guides the Principal regarding the

implementation of diligence and empowered to decentralize the academic and administrative activities. Academic Council regularly effectively monitors academic activities. Various Functional-Committees/Cells/Clubs are formed in which representatives of the students are involved.

The College Development Committee (CDC) is instrumental in planning, monitoring and evaluating the administration and academic processes. Staff members become part of the planning, decision making process of CDC through representative members. Major decisions like Budget, New Courses, implementation and accountability of the teaching-learning process are recommended.

Strategic plan is prepared in tune with the vision and mission of the college. Thus moving into a fully furnished new building, Modernization of laboratory and equipment, ICT enabled classrooms, Library infrastructure up-gradation, Facilities for e-learning, Safety and Security Management, Renewable energy usage system, Hygiene, and green campus. Anti-ragging, Anti Sexual harassment cell, Grievance redressal cell, and Women's cell are established.

To promote quality culture in the campus, IQAC brings in quality initiatives such as,

- Regular submission of AQAR
- Various welfare measures are undertaken.
- FDPs and SDPs for staff empowerment
- Organization of seminars/ Conferences/Workshops conducted on quality aspects
- Feedback Analysis & AAA (Academic & Administrative Audit)
- The managing council of the college with representatives, the Principal, the staff representatives collaborate in a democratic manner in carrying out the administrative responsibilities.

Internal and External Financial Audit is conducted in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. The external audit is conducted by R. D. Lukad.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The College vision to “To develop the knowledge, skills and character of our students who will helps us in creating and sustaining an environment conducive to academic and professional excellence.” is achieved through various activities. Environmental Consciousness and Sustainability is practiced . A Green Audit was conducted.

Gender equality is promoted through programmes for gender sensitization and self-defense for students, teaching and non-teaching staff. Gender equity, gender sensitivity promotion initiatives are organized frequently to facilitate in creating awareness among students and the public about women's rights at home, at work, and in society.

The institution conducts an Inauguration program in the beginning of the year to ensure that the newly admitted students inculcate the code of conduct. The college has defined codes of conduct for students, Teaching and supporting staff . The institution, by providing opportunities to participate and celebrate commemorative and national days of importance to imbibe in the minds of students' awareness on contemporary issues and the spirit of Nationalism.

The institution promotes practice of national integration, communal harmony and social cohesion and

fundamental duties through various programs and activities. The College focuses on the education and development of the socially and financially weaker sections of society.

1. Initiatives towards women empowerment:

The institution, through the various committees and cells like the Women Development Cell, Association of World Women Club (AWWC), Entrepreneurship Cell & Incubation centre and other committees, each of which includes a faculty member as convenor, faculty and student members. A semester-by-semester plan of action is developed for organizing various programs such as seminars/workshops and interactive sessions. The Principal, IQAC Coordinator, and Coordinators of respective committees oversee the implementation of the plan of action.

2. Initiatives for holistic development in tune with vision and mission:

The practice of comprehensive student development necessitates concerted efforts at numerous levels by staff, students, and other stakeholders. It includes not only basic teaching-learning activities, but also a slew of other efforts such as co-curricular/extra-curricular activities, extension initiatives, students' participation in college events, expert talks, helpful infrastructural and ICT resources, and faculty engagement.

The college's forte is a plethora of co-curricular/extra-curricular and extension activities that are perfectly matched with regular study. NSS unit, DLLE, Women Cell, Placement Cell, Entrepreneurship Cell & Incubation Centre, and other committees are actively involved in the organization of these activities in order to develop in students a profound awareness to their environment.

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences using ICT tools

Response:

The IQAC ensures that faculties along with traditional lecture method uses various student centric pedagogical techniques for an effective teaching learning experience and improved learning outcomes for students.

Following measures are taken to make learning student-centric:

“When experience is the core of the learning process, learning takes place naturally”

Experiential Learning Techniques: -

- Practical’s for each course like a demonstration, hands-on experience, self-directed learning by doing practical record monitoring, field visit, industrial visit, NSS camps, excursion, tour & group discussion helps students in experiential learning.
- Group Dissertation Project involving data collection, analysis, interpretation of results, suggestions, and conclusions help in widening the knowledge of students.
- Department-level educational trips, Industry visits, press visits, Theatre visits etc. are organized to nurture and expand the subject interest and learning experience.
- The students are encouraged to take part in various extra and co-curricular activities, intra/interdepartmental, inter/Intra college events which enhance their planning, organizational and managerial skills through events like Mridang (Institution’s Annual cultural fest), Commerce Week, Management Fest, and Science Fair & Inter-Collegiate Fests.
- Subject experts from different domains, eminent personalities in the field of Administration,

Science and Technology, Social Sciences, Culture & Literature, Media, Business & Commerce, Social Reformers, Entrepreneurs, Artists, etc. are invited as Guest speakers to address students through seminars, ability development programs, workshops, group discussions, and industry-academia interactions.

Participative learning:

- Curricular aspects such as Group Assignment, Group Projects, Group Practical, Survey, and Practical make theoretical knowledge stronger as per the requirement of present-day learning.
- Students are encouraged to take part in various academic and non-academic competitions/events to widen their holistic and life learning skills.
- Mandatory Group events and team building activities (Group Discussions, Projects & Presentations, and Case Studies) are assigned to students which help them in reflective thinking, team problem solving, and logical addressing associated issues leading to developing collaborative, participative learning skills.
- Activities such as seminars, quizzes, and projects are conducted to stimulate the critical thinking skills of the students. Participation in various national and cultural festivals develop acceptance of unity in diversity as working with peer groups.

Problem Solving Methodologies:

- studies, Study of Current Affairs: Used to increase student participation and develop problem solving skills.
- Business Games, Business quiz: Used to develop logical reasoning and problem-solving skills.
- Assignments, quizzes, presentations: Used to develop logical reasoning and problem-solving skills.
- Project exhibitions: Questioning and exploring skills are developed among students.
- Tutorials: Problem solving skills.
- Case studies

The Institution encourage the teacher to use various ICT tools which emphasize mentoring students and enhance their learning experience. The diversity of the students in terms of their educational background and experiences makes it necessary to implement innovative ICT teaching strategies to enhance learning patterns. More than 65% of classrooms are equipped with LCDs and other teaching aids. Along with the chalk and talk, ICT enabled classes enable students to understand the concepts effectively.

The teacher uses hardware like a Personal laptop, Desktop, Projector provided by the college. Teachers are using software like Adobe pdf reader, MS-office (word, excel PowerPoint), Internet browser, YouTube. Teachers are using WhatsApp, Google classroom as a teaching and learning platform. The college emphasizes to use LMS, various tools and platforms for online teaching, it includes Zoom meetings, Google Meetings and Microsoft Team. It helped in enhancing Teaching Learning during the time of the pandemic.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The examination process is transparent and compliant with the University of Mumbai guidelines. Students and their parents are informed about examination process through orientation program in the First Year. Semester end and internal examinations of Undergraduate programmes are handled by examination committee.

Examination Committee:

The Committee consists of Convener, Co-Convener and members from all Undergraduate departments. Non-teaching staff also lend its support in administrative work. The examination committee performs following functions to maintain transparency and robustness of examination procedure:

For internal and semester end examinations:

- Time table and seating arrangement for examination are displayed on the notice board adequately in advance.
- For internal examination, syllabus is declared by subject teacher and semester end examination is conducted on entire syllabus.
- The question papers are verified to eliminate errors and stored in sealed envelope.
- Supervision duty chart is drafted and informed to teachers.
- Separate seating arrangement for students with learning disability and the writer, reader and extra time to such students as per university guidelines.
- Requisite number of copies are printed just 2 hours before actual examination.
- Attendance of students is maintained properly during examination.
- Any unfair activity of the student is reported to Unfair Means Committee for appropriate investigation and action.
- Examination Committee determines deadline for assessment of answer books. Teachers update marks in result processing software “Graded”.

Additional responsibilities for semester end examinations:

- Prepare examination timetable one month in advance and its submission to lead college designated by university.
- Subject teachers prepare 3 sets of encrypted question papers and submit to the designated email address.
- The question paper for examination is selected randomly by the authority. Moderation of answer books is done as per guidelines of university.
- External moderators are called from the list of moderators provided by the lead college.
- Examination committee members verify the final result and then grade cards are printed.

Infrastructure for examination related work:

- The College has designated a specific room having necessary equipments including Computer, Printer, Photocopier and Paper -Shredder for examination work. The room has restricted access and is under continuous CCTV surveillance.

Frequency of the examinations:

- All Internal, re-internal, practical, semester end and supplementary examinations are conducted once in each semester.
- Project evaluation is done as per requirement of Programme Structure.

Additional examinations are conducted for eligible students as per university guidelines. All practical examinations, internal evaluation of projects and internal examination of Postgraduate programmes are carried out by individual departments as per university guidelines.

All these processes are-

Time bound;

- Time tables displayed well in advance,
- Hall tickets are issued at the proper time,
- Question papers submission schedule is given to faculties,
- Schedules regarding the time for application for Revaluation, evaluation and declaration of results given by the examination committee,
- Unfair means enquiry meeting and declare the decision of the Committee,
- Schedule for moderation in coordination with assessment completion,
- Schedule for submission of marks, based on which verification will begin

Transparent;

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website and attainment of POs and COs are evaluated

Response:

The College takes a number of steps in dissemination of the vision, mission and programme outcomes among students and other stakeholders. The vision and mission statement is displayed at all strategic locations in the College, College Prospectus and Institutional website. The Programme Outcomes of all graduate and post graduate programmes offered by the Institution are displayed on the College website. During the admission process, the teachers counsel the prospective students and parents on the expected outcomes of programmes for selecting their course for admission. Orientation programmes organized for all first year students acquaints the students with the vision, mission and the expected outcomes of their selected programmes. The meeting held for parents of first year students is also used to guide parents to understand the expected outcomes.

Assessment for Attainment of POs, PSOs and COs is the process carried out by the institution, that identify, collect and prepare data to evaluate the achievement of POs, PSOs and COs. Assessment methods are categorized as following.

Direct Method (80%)

- Define POs , PSOs and COs
- Setting the POs , PSOs and COs Target Articulation matrix
- CO Assessment (setting and measurement):-Internal Assessment (25%) & External Assessment (75%)
- Attainment of POs/PSOs

This method display the student's knowledge and skills from their performance in the continuous internal assessment tests, semester examinations and supporting activities such as seminars, assignments, case study, group discussion, online quiz, mini project etc., These methods provide a sampling of what students know or can do and provide strong evidence of student learning.

Procedure for attainment of POs, PSOs and COs through Direct Method:

- Define POs/PSOs and COs at Institutional level.
- Setting Target level of Attainment of POs/PSOs: Articulation matrix has been set with correlation levels of 3, 2, 1 and '-' which denotes high, medium, low and no correlation respectively of COs with POs/PSOs, then target attainment level for each PO/PSO is set. Setting and Measurement of COs assessment: It is calculated in levels 3,2,1 for high, medium, low respectively, on the basis of number of students obtaining greater than or equal to 50% marks in both internal and semester end examination.
- Obtain POs/PSOs attainment table: Assessment of Internal and semester end examinations are considered with the weightage of 25% and 75% respectively for attainment of POs/PSOs. **Indirect Method (20%)**
- Exit Survey
- Attainment of POs/PSOs

Indirect assessment is done through program exit survey. It is conducted for students who have graduated from the institution for that year. Relevant questionnaire to evaluate attainment of POs/PSOs is given in exit survey form.

The Institute has constantly endeavored to provide quality education and ensure all round development of the students in order to make them aware, responsible and empowered citizen.

The institution has a well maintained, user friendly and resilient infrastructure conducive to teaching, learning and comprehensive development of students.

The Institute has adequate infrastructure which is shared by all the programmes in two shifts and has --- lecture halls, 2 computer labs, 2 laboratories, 15 lecture halls are equipped with LCD, 2 lecture halls with smart boards & internet in the entire campus.

The institute has 100 computers including laptops. All systems are connected to 50Mbps broadband Internet through LAN connections. The campus is under the surveillance of CCTVs installed in the campus including lecture halls.

The Institute has an examination control room and OSM facility incorporated in computers. Other facilities are Computer with webcam (to download University question papers) CCTV, Photocopier Machine, Paper Shredder, printing room.

The institute has well-stocked 2 College Library. It is fully air-conditioned, Wi-Fi enabled and has a sufficient seating capacity. The ground floor of the library has a circulation (Issue/Return) counter, Online Public Access Catalogue, Processing Section, and Stacks. The first floor has a Text-Book Section, Periodical Section and computer access. Reading facility is available for faculties and students on the ground floor as well as the third floor. The Library is connected to the internet by LAN and Wi-Fi, which has 50 Mbps internet bandwidth allows to access e-journals through INFLIBNET and N-LIST, Reference Section, Book Bank, etc.

To promote entrepreneurship and research, the Institute has established an Incubation Centre with 02 computers having Internet connectivity.

There is a separate room/cabin for Principal, Vice-Principal, Registrar, Counsellor, UG, PG staff, administrative staff and each of the Statutory committees. All departments in the College are equipped with Laptop, ample storage space for departmental documents, Projects and Assignments submitted by students.

A spacious Amphitheatre, fully equipped and air-conditioned Auditorium is available with state-of-the-art infrastructure and apparatus for co-curricular, recreational and cultural activities. It has a seating capacity of 500 persons. The auditorium has been provided with a screen and a projector.

To facilitate co-curricular and cultural activities, the college has open auditorium. With plug and play

facility to cater to the needs of the audio-visual necessity of the events, with a seating capacity 200 in the auditorium.

The college is committed to offering resourceful infrastructure for holistic growth of students. It provides adequate facilities for cultural activities, indoor and outdoor sports as well as other student and faculty support amenities.

The Committee caters to various sports and is instrumental in promoting the performance of students in different sports.

The college is planning to establish Yoga Kendra with a capacity of 50. Currently the College is conducting Yoga in the Auditorium. The yoga instructor trains as well as oversees yoga sessions for students and staff.

Library is partially automated using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS).

- The college Library is a gateway to a world of Information. The Staff and students have unlimited access to a wealth of Information found in resources like books, magazines, Journals, Hand Books, seminar reports. It also maintains Question Papers of all the streams for reference.
- The College Library is fully air-conditioned; Wi-Fi enabled and has a sufficient seating capacity. An e-resource Centre has been established in the library to enable students to access information for their academic pursuits through internet and e-resources.
- The OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue) module of the software allows library database searching by entering preferred terms and is mainly used for information retrieval.
- Books are procured on the recommendation made by Library Committee & course faculties which also takes into consideration the users' requirements.
- The College library uses SOUL 3.0 for:
 - Making entries for daily issue/return of books.
 - Searching books by keywords like name of the author, title of the book etc.
 - Regular updates of books purchased by the library.
 - Generating Reports of the books issued.
 - Generating reports by applying various filters like program-wise list of books, subject-wise list of books or a list of reference books etc.

The NLIST - The college has subscribed N-List (National Library & Information Services Infrastructure for scholarly content). N-LIST provides access to 6000+e-journals and 31,35000 e-books.

A Library committee consisting of the librarian and faculty members is set up every year. It organizes various Information Literacy and other events for the students and faculty members. The library staff is encouraged to attend workshops and seminars for self-upgradation.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

College is equipped with all the necessary ICT infrastructure to felicitate the Teaching-Learning activity for our students.

- Information Technology has become an indispensable asset for the functioning of every institution. Hence, to meet the demands of the various stakeholders, the Institute frequently updates its IT infrastructure.

- The Institute currently has 100 computers including Laptops. The computers have been steadily upgraded either by bringing in new devices or upgrading existing devices.
- Computer Labs have adequate number of desktops maintaining student ratio.
- The college has 18 LCD projectors, 2 smart boards.
- The College has purchased Raspberry Pi Kits & Logic Circuit Trainer.
- The College has employed a full time IT Lab Assistant and consultant for maintenance and support of the ICT infrastructure.
- In general, computing and internet facilities are available to all teachers and students on the campus.
- The Institute uses open-source software. However, with respect to the prescribed syllabus, several licensed software's are also used like Microsoft for the use of various software and Windows Operating System. A licensed copy of antivirus (Quick-heal) is installed on machines. The institute has built in firewall in load balancer.
- The Exam room has a dedicated internet connection & webcam fitted computer for downloading University question papers, a mounted CCTV which covers the entire room and is also equipped with a paper shredder and a photocopy device. From the year 2016-17, the College is using official google email-id for receiving the password protected question papers from all faculties.
- A back up is taken for all the staff systems on NAS every three to Six Hours, windows and anti-virus are updated on a regular basis. LAN and Network connections are also monitored by the IT technician.
- The computers of the college are connected with printers and scanners wherever required at all important work areas.
- Language lab and Research Lab is augmented with Head phones, Printer, software and digitized audio-video materials to develop communication skills among students, and research scholars.
- The College has an active website. The Website is dynamic and displays the latest notifications promptly.
- The institute has 24*7 CCTV surveillance in entire campus.
 - The college has three internet connection for college and one separate line for examination, having bandwidth of more than 100 mbps.

The nature of governance, effective leadership, perspective plans and teacher’s participation in decision making etc. are in tune with the vision and mission of the institution.

The Institution abides by the rules and regulations & policies accepted in the Governing Body. The Governing Body delegates authority to the principal, who in turn share it with the different levels of functionaries in the college. The policies are monitored and necessary corrections are made to suit the present-day requirement.

The College Development Committee (CDC), an apex body responsible for planning and evaluating the administrative and academic processes. The staff members become a part of the planning and decision-making process through their representation in the CDC.

CDC has representation of 04 teachers, 01 non-teaching and 02 students.

Major decisions related to sanctioning of budget, approval of new courses, implementation, revision and accountability of teaching learning process are taken by the Governing Body.

The principal ably supported by the Teachers-in-Charge who help in executing the strategic and perspective plans through their department members. The Principal forms the committees with the support of a teacher or a non-teaching staff for overall management of the various operations of the college.

Academic performance of an institution improvised by the decentralization policy followed by the active involvement of all stakeholders to bring forth good infrastructure and quality teaching which results in better learning outcomes in the students.

CASE STUDY

MRIDANG, The Inter Collegiate Cultural Festival

MRIDANG, The Inter Collegiate Cultural Festival of the College showcases the practice of decentralization and participative management in entirety.

The cultural Committee and then the Student Council of the College is entrusted with the task of organizing the event. To strengthen the idea of participative decision making, the Principal of the College consults with the staff members and student representatives.

Under the guidance of Staff Advisors to Student Council, various Committees and Sub-Committees are constituted to take care of Sponsorship, Finance and Accounts, Programmes, Stalls, Security, Advertising and Logistics.

The MRIDANG Core Committee and the Principal put up Duty Charts for Teaching and Nonteaching Staff. Each staff member has to voluntarily sign up for the slots of duties on both days of the event.

Decentralization of administration in Mridang refers primarily to a process, in which students are given a free hand to take decisions about the judicious use of resources, financial management, execution of programmes, security arrangements, and so on. This sort of decentralization allows the students to be more responsible, responsive, sensitive and proactive to exercise their own discretion for planning and execution in a participatory and democratic environment.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

Response:

The Organogram of the institution reflects the organizational structure of the institution. It shows the relationship among departments, heads, teaching and non-teaching staff etc., The top to bottom status of different units. The main purpose of organogram is to distribute responsibility/workload equally and effectively among the employees.

1. Governing Body: - It consists of top management executives. This body is responsible for the overall

growth of the institution including building, college surroundings, expansion, modernization, and renovation, etc. This body executes the decisions through the principal.

2. Principal: - At the institutional level, the principal as the head of administration acts as a bridge between the Management and staff. The principal executes all major decisions taken by the governing body. As an academic head, the Principal finalizes the schedule of all academic activities. Principal serves under the Governing Council, Government, and University bodies and adheres to all rules and regulations. Both teaching and non-teaching staff work under her. She is the ex officio chairman of all administrative committees.

Financial audit aims at ensuring financial transparency, essential for the smooth running of the institution. Institution conducts internal and external financial audits on a regular basis. Mechanism for Internal Audit and External Audit is as follows.

Internal Audit:

- Internal audit is a continuous process which ensues after each and every financial transaction, whereby the college itself carries out the initial stage of the internal audit.
- Proper procedure for purchases is adopted. Quotations are called for and prices are compared
- Corrections are effected on the basis of the audit report and clarifications called by them are submitted as an audit reply

External Audit:

- The external audit takes place annually after the completion of every financial year. The Chartered Accountant, who works as an auditor is appointed by the College.
- The bills and vouchers of the revenue expenditure are checked.
- The Management has appointed the external auditor for auditing the financial statements of the Society at the end of the financial year ending 31st March, in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in India. Based on the audit of financial statements, the responsibility of the auditor is to express an opinion in the form of Auditor's Report on whether the statements are

fair and free from material misstatements.

Optimal Utilization of Funds:

The Institution has its own policy for utilization of funds as it is self-reliant and independent and manages the finances effectively. (Self-Finance College)

Funds generated through fees collected from students are used to disburse salary to staff and finance other academic activities.

All the collections are deposited in the bank and all expenditure, recurring and non-recurring, are incurred through Cheques/Electronic mode. Only authorized persons by management can operate the transaction through the bank.

Women's empowerment entails liberating women from the vicious circle of social, political, economic, and gender-based discrimination. It is critical for them to be trained in order to better serve their family at home and professionally. Women's economic involvement and empowerment are critical to strengthening women's rights and allowing them to have control over their life and have influence in society. Skill development not only creates job prospects but also empowers people. Women, when given the correct opportunities and exposure, may excel in any industry. Such skill development activities are held for students on a regular basis in college to implant the necessary skills and abilities in order to shape their overall personality.

The Practice:

By empowering young women, skill development training programs aim to provide skills to improve employability, boost confidence, and earn cash in order to achieve economic and social independence. Associations/cells/clubs are tasked with carrying out training programs such as certificate courses, workshops, demonstrations, hands-on training, contests, and awareness lectures to improve employable skills. The women's development cell supervises the plan of action.

Various programs were held with the active participation of the AWWC, WDC, and College, such as a one-day picnic at Mandvi Resort, Virar, Christmas Eve, and New Year celebration, "Nakshatra" An Exhibition for Ladies Celebrating Women's Day, Joy of giving drive, Unequal Pay: Gender Discrimination at Work Place, sessions on 'Smart Girls'.

Evidence of Success:

- "Nakshatra" An Exhibition for ladies Celebrating Women's Day- Business opportunities provided to females including college students wherein they put up their stalls and revenue was generated out of it. The event attracted approximately 1000 women from all over Mumbai.

- “Unequal Pay: Gender Discrimination at Work Place”- Everyone was educated on unconscious gender bias. Raising awareness about gender equality in the workplace, taking into account everyone's requirements, and providing equal chances, promotions, and awards for women. More than 250 attendees actively participated, and Gender equality was encouraged.
- Smart Girl Program- Educating girls on self-awareness, self-esteem, and self-defense, as well as communication and other life skills. Making them more self-aware. This webinar inspired and encouraged 58 students who participated in this program.
- Women's Day Special Workshop- Women with baking abilities are not limited to working at home. Rather, there are numerous job opportunities available. Furthermore, this workshop assisted approximately 350 women in improving their bakery and culinary skills.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- The humble and quiet students were afraid to cross academic boundaries, limiting the success of awareness initiatives.
- Ensuring faculty members' overall support and participation in the programs is a difficult task.
- Female faculty members must handle students' impulsiveness on love concerns in adolescence.
- Organizing multiple programs during working hours has hampered classwork.

Advanced students have the option to engage in research projects with a mentor-teacher and participate in scientific working model creation, producing research papers, presenting their research work, and so on. After conducting a proper SWOT analysis of the student, each student is allocated a mentor-teacher who assists the student in their academic advancement and placements. With one mandated online evaluation, the assessment techniques are flexible.
