








Cultural Week Celebration!

It offers flexible Continuing Education opportunities for the people. Reena Mehta College of Arts, Science, Commerce and Management Studies has a department dedicated to it. Every year the Department of Lifelong Learning and Extension organises the Annual Extension Work Festival titled "UDAAN – the flight of Extension" in the months of January - February in a decentralised manner in Mumbai, Thane, Palghar, Raigad, Ratnagiri and Sindhudurg— the districts under the jurisdiction of the University of Mumbai. This year DLLE department of Reena Mehta College was given the responsibility to organise Udaan on the college campus. On __ day of January 2023, the inter-collegiate festival was organised in an offline mode. It invited all Extension Work colleges to participate in the festival. The Best Performances and Best Displays were awarded the Udaan Certificate based on the recommendations of the panel of expert judges. The Organizing College, Field Coordinators, Extension Teachers and Anchors were felicitated with Special Contribution Certificate. The objectives of the festival: -
